

Mrs. Berquist is the author of *Designing Your Own Classical Curriculum* and editor of *The Harp and Laurel Wreath: Poetry and Dictation for the Classical Curriculum*. Based on the philosophy of the classical Trivium—grammar, logic, and rhetoric—she has developed a modern classical home school curriculum for grades K-12 that strengthens character and intellect, and reinforces virtue. Mrs. Berquist is a graduate of Thomas Aquinas College in Santa Paula, CA. She home-schooled her six children for 23 years. All of them graduated from Thomas Aquinas College, in Santa Paula, CA. Four are married and currently three of them are in graduate school, two in philosophy.

Sharon Hensley is the author of [Home Schooling Children with Special Needs](#). She holds a Master's Degree in Special Education and has worked with a variety of special needs children including her oldest daughter who is autistic and mentally retarded. Sharon began teaching in 1983, and moved into the field of special education in 1985. She has done classroom teaching, private therapy and consulting. She began home schooling in 1992 and is currently the director of Almaden Valley Christian School, an ISP for families with special needs children.




Mother of 12, grandmother of almost twice that number, **Virginia (Ginny) Seuffert** has been homeschooling her children and now her grandchildren for a quarter of a century. In her native New York, Ginny lectured, debated and wrote articles for the pro-life movement. After moving to Chicago in 1988, she switched her focus to strengthening the family, especially through Catholic homeschooling. With that goal in mind, she has spoken at over 150 conferences in the United States and Canada, and authored over 100 articles. She has written three books for parents. The most recent *It doesn't Have to Be Like This* offers advice on child discipline. Her next book, available in the summer of 2014 will discuss homeschooling as an alternative for the Common Core. She has founded numerous organizations to provide information and support to Catholic families at the local, state, and national level. In addition to writing and speaking, Ginny has been a guest on numerous regional and national radio programs and has appeared on EWTN. The Illinois Press Association presented her a first place award for a column she authored in a local paper defending traditional values. Ginny and her husband Ed reside near Chicago.

Mary Ann Shapiro is a lifelong educator. She started by teaching neighborhood children their catechism using the blackboard in the garage and never looked back. She graduated from Thomas Aquinas College and received her teaching credential through California State University at Los Angeles. After teaching in parochial schools in Los Angeles and working at the Department of Education during the Reagan administration, she 'retired' to raise her family. She is committed to homeschooling, educating her own children at home, working with parents through Christ the King Academy, her private school, and in recent years, working with the independent study charter school, Ocean Grove Charter School, where she is an Education Specialist, Educational Liaison to the community, and a Support Provider for new teachers who are facing their first year of teaching. Her thirty years of experience is broad and gives her a unique perspective on the world of home education.



Commander B.T Chapman is a retired commissioned officer of the United States Navy. He was on active duty from 1961-63 where he served in the supply corps in Athens, Georgia and then in Maag, Saigon, Vietnam. After serving the Naval Air Reserve from 1963 – 1985, he became a Naval Academy Blue and Gold Officer. In 2013, 2011, and 2010, he served on the Service Academy Congressional Nomination Committees. The 2014 Northern California Catholic Homeschool Conference is honored to welcome Commander Chapman to speak at this year's conference. He will be giving a presentation on how a homeschool student can apply and be accepted to a military academy.

Deacon Craig Anderson and his wife, Mary Therese, live in San Jose and have five, mostly-grown, children, all of whom were home educated. Deacon Craig serves at St. Basil the Great Byzantine Catholic Church in Los Gatos and works as a Deputy Fire Marshal with the Santa Clara Fire Department. He has an MA in Theology and Ministry from Franciscan University of Steubenville, in Ohio. The Andersons have been home schooling for almost 20 years. Introduction to Homeschooling, by Mary Ann Shapiro

A brief overview of Catholic homeschooling: Why anyone would choose it, the different resources and methods from which to choose, and some basic tips from 30 years of experience. Q & A following.

The Four Deadly Errors of Teaching Writing, By Andrew Pudewa

We've all suffered it at one time or another: Frustration about writing assignments. Either on the receiving end, or perhaps now on the giving end, there can be a few distinctly discouraging aspects to teaching and being taught writing. The tough questions include: What to correct and how to give a grade? How much help is too much? Isn't the assignment clear enough? Why don't students find their own errors? Learn and avoid four teaching mistakes that contribute to this frustration: Overcorrecting, Holding Back Help, Unclear Assignments, & Over-Expectation.

Entrepreneurship Education - Why and How, by Andrew Pudewa

Many of us realize that we value home education not only because it often results in better academics, superior social environments, and enriched family life, but because it builds a better community and country. The result of true liberal education---a *freedomship* education---will be not only young men and women who know how to think and communicate, but who think evangelically and entrepreneurially. To revive a culture of self-sufficiency and freedom requires more people with the owner/entrepreneur mindset and fewer with the employee mindset. Join Andrew for a discussion of how to cultivate an entrepreneurial, or georgic, aptitude in our children. The future of freedom may depend on it.

Teaching Boys and Other Children Who Would Rather Build Forts All Day, by Andrew Pudewa

Children *like* to do what they *can* do; they *want* to do what they *think they can* do, and they *hate* to do what they *think they cannot* do. If you want excited and enthusiastic children who learn well, you must understand these key laws of motivation, and focus on the essential requirement of relevancy. If it matters, children will learn it, and if it doesn't, they won't. This session will enlighten you with specific ways to find and create relevancy for children, even when they have no apparent interest.

Homeschool to escape the Common Core, by Ginny Seuffert

Parents are up in arms about the Common Core's poorly written standards, confusing curriculum, grueling test schedule, and invasion of family privacy. While we should all be working towards throwing the Common core into the dustbin of history, what can we do to help our children now? Home schooling offers educational excellence at a very affordable price. You can do it.

Last Things First, by Laura Berquist

Laura will discuss how to design your children's course of studies. "For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven" (Eccl. 3:1). There is a right time for thinking about subjects, and a right way to think about them at a given time. One does not just give the student 'classical authors' and think that he is giving a 'classical education'. The material has to be given at the right time and in the right way. For those interested in classical education, it is important to understand that there is an order in both the method and the content of the classical curriculum.

The Importance of Imagination in Education, by Laura Berquist

We want our children to have strong, effective, and sacramentally formed imaginations. We do this by paying attention to the method of education and to the content of education. There are two usual meanings to the word “imagination”. Both of them are important for our imagination when we think. Aristotle teaches us, and St. Thomas Aquinas confirms his doctrine, that the agent intellect - the natural light of our understanding—uses the phantasm, or image, in the imagination to make an impression on our power to understand. This is the process by which we begin to think about any subject. If the imagination is strong, and the images are clear, the thinker is better able to think. So, as Catholic educators, and homeschooling parents, the formation of the imagination is a matter of great concern.

The Naval Academy: How to Prepare, How to Survive, & How to Get In, by Commander B.T Chapman

Socialization: Why Homeschooling Works, by Pamela Patnode

¡La socialización: Por qué la educación en casa funciona!

“What about socialization? Have you ever been asked that question? Have you asked it yourself? This is quite possibly the most commonly asked question of homeschoolers today. Dr. Robert Epstein defines socialization as ‘The process by which we learn to be a part of a community.’ In this presentation, Pamela Patnode will discuss the community to which we ultimately want our children to belong. She will distinguish between positive socialization and negative socialization, and give examples of the numerous opportunities for home educated youth to be involved in social opportunities. Pamela will also share results from multiple studies which have been conducted related to the socialization of home educated youth compared with young people educated in more traditional school settings. The results might surprise you. Come learn about the benefits of home schooling and how to provide students with positive socialization.

About Our Lady of Peace Shrine



In August of 1980, Msgr. John J. Sweeny, then pastor of Our Lady of Peace Church in Santa Clara, California, commissioned Charles C. Parks, a noted sculptor, of Wilmington, Delaware, to design a 32-foot stainless steel statue of Our Lady. Thus began a remarkable odyssey, of a truly extraordinary image of the Blessed Virgin, the Mother of God. When completed, the statue was blessed and dedicated by Bishop Pierre DuMaine of the Diocese of San Jose. The ceremony took place October 7, 1983, on the Feast of the Most Holy Rosary and we received a special blessing for the dedication ceremony from Pope John Paul II. After 28 years, the Shrine to the Immaculate Heart of Mary at Our Lady of Peace is still the only major Marian Shrine on the West Coast between Our Lady of Sorrows Shrine in Portland, Oregon, (over 700 miles to the north), and the famous Basilica of Our Lady of Guadalupe in Mexico City, (over 2,300 miles to the south). Because of the Shrine, thousands of people visit the shrine weekly from neighboring parishes and from across the country.
